Introduction: This class serves as the staff class for the Texan Mosaic (texanmosaic.com) and focuses on teaching students skills related to the media industry, including pre-production planning, production of news videos and live news casts, and post-production editing of news videos and news casts.

Learning Objectives:

- Pre-production planning
- Contacting sources for interviews
- Writing scripts/articles
- Knowledge of digital cameras
- Audio/video post-production using Adobe Creative Cloud
- Television studio & field lighting
- Basic studio & field audio applications for internet and television
- Use of media sources & research
- Using the internet to support production
- Use of computer-generated graphics & editing

Attendance & Participation: Attendance is a critical component of this hands-on learning class. Because the course is designed around in-person activities, projects, and collaborative work, students are expected to attend every class session and be actively engaged in the project-based learning process. Participation accounts for 25% of your overall grade and is heavily dependent on consistent attendance and active involvement in class activities.

If you are unable to attend a class or are unprepared to work on a current project, you will be assigned a new project to ensure you remain engaged with the course material and meet the learning objectives. Please note that failure to attend without prior arrangement or a legitimate excuse may result in a reduction of your participation grade.

Should you anticipate missing class, please inform me as early as possible, and we will discuss a plan to keep you on track with the course. Regular attendance and participation are essential for success in this course.

Project Requirements and Grading

In this class, students will be required to complete a series of hands-on projects that simulate real-world news production. Each project will focus on developing different aspects of news media production, including scriptwriting, video package creation, and on-the-ground reporting. Projects will be graded based on completion and adherence to deadlines, as well as the quality of work demonstrated.

Types of Projects:

- News Video Packages: Students will be tasked with creating video packages that tell compelling news stories. These packages should incorporate various video elements such as b-roll, sound bites (SOT), and interviews, and will be graded on how effectively the story is told, production quality, and technical proficiency.
- Scriptwriting for Live News Broadcasts: Students will write scripts for live news casts to introduce packages or segments they have produced, along with any other writing that is assigned to them. Scripts should be clear, concise, and formatted according to industry standards.
- **B-roll Gathering for Voice Overs (VO) and Sound Bites (SOT)**: Students will gather b-roll footage to support voiceovers and sound bite segments, ensuring that the visuals align with the narration and help convey the story clearly.

Grading and Deadlines:

Each project will be graded based on a rubric that evaluates specific aspects of the assignment, such as:

• Adherence to Project Guidelines: Whether the project meets the objectives outlined in the assignment.

- **Quality of Work**: The overall technical quality, including production value, clarity, and storytelling.
- **Timeliness**: Whether the project is completed on time and within the allotted deadlines.

Students are expected to meet all deadlines and follow the expectations outlined in the rubrics provided for each project. Late submissions will result in a reduction of points unless prior arrangements have been made. Participation in class project work is also critical for your success, as it is tied to your overall grade.

Participation in Recorded News Casts

As part of this course, students will be required to participate in **recorded news casts** that will take place once a month, beginning in **February**. These news casts are a key component of the class and contribute significantly to your overall grade (30%). The news casts will be recorded and posted online to the **Texan Mosaic website** and shared on the class's **social media pages**. **Attendance and Participation:**

- **Mandatory Attendance**: Attendance for the recorded news cast is **mandatory**. Students will be assigned specific roles and jobs related to the production, such as on-air talent, scriptwriting, camera operation, editing, or directing. Each student's ability to participate and perform their assigned role will directly impact their grade.
- **Impact on Grade**: Participation in the news cast is worth **30**% of your final grade. If you are absent or fail to participate without prior communication, you will receive a **zero** for that portion of your grade.
- **Absences and Communication**: If you are unable to participate in a news cast due to unforeseen circumstances, it is your responsibility to inform the instructor **as soon as possible** to discuss alternative arrangements for earning the points. Failure to communicate about your absence or to make alternative arrangements may result in a **zero** for that grade.

Your active participation in the news cast is crucial for both your grade and the success of the production. Please be sure to plan accordingly and prioritize attendance on recording days.
