1. Course Description

Art Appreciation is a study of the visual arts for non-art majors emphasizing an investigation of the nature of art – past and present, in western and non-western cultures. Students will learn to recognize art not only as the expression of individual artists but also as the reflection of wider cultural identities (religious, political, and social). To achieve this goal, students will learn to identify the basic formal elements underlying all art forms, the processes by which visual art is created, and the many ways of "seeing" and "interpreting" works of art.

5. Tardiness and Attendance Policy

Missed Work

Assignment Rules

All assignments handed in must be typed and prepared in APA style! Electronic submissions (e.g., attachments via e-mail or on a disc) will not be accepted. Please use 12-point type, double space your text, use standard margins, and insert page numbers on the top right-hand corner of each page. All assignments must be submitted with a cover page which includes students' full names, ID numbers, title of assignment, and date. And, please use spell-check and proofread as points might be deducted for an excessive number of careless errors.

Plagiarism

Plagiarism is a form of dishonesty that occurs when a person passes off someone else's work as his or her own. This can range from failing to cite an author for ideas incorporated into a

student's paper to cutting and pasting paragraphs from different websites to handing in a paper downloaded from the internet. All are plagiarism.

All parties to plagiarism are considered equally guilty. If you share your coursework with another student and she plagiarizes it, you are considered as guilty as the one who has plagiarized your work, since you enabled the plagiarism to take place. Under no circumstances should a student make her coursework available to another student unless the instructor gives explicit permission for this to happen. Copying someone's work is an extreme and straightforward act of plagiarism. More commonly, however, students plagiarize without realizing they are doing so. This generally happens when a student fails to acknowledge the source of an idea or phrasing. Avoid plagiarism by citing sources properly!

Cheating

You may neither receive help from nor give help to others during an in-class exam. During exams, you may not leave the room, talk, or use dictionaries, translators, cell phones or programmable calculators. And please keep your eyes on your own work.
