Catalog Description:

A chronological analysis of the historical and cultural context for the visual arts from the 14th century to the present day. Semester Hours: 3 Lecture Hours: 3

This course is designed to satisfy three hours of Creative Arts credit in the Foundation Component Area: Courses in this category focus on the appreciation and analysis of creative artifacts and works of the human imagination. Courses involve the synthesis and interpretation of artistic expression and enable critical, creative, and innovative communication about works of art

Course Description:

This course examines the visual arts, including painting, sculpture, printmaking, photography, and architecture, from prehistory to the present. While emphasis is placed on the arts of Europe and the United States, those of Latin America, Africa, and Asia are also discussed.

Learning Outcomes for Art History:

- 1. Employ the vocabulary and concepts used to discuss works of art, artists, and art history.
- 2. Identify the visual hallmarks of regional and period styles for formal, technical, and expressive qualities.

3. Interpret the meaning of works of art from diverse cultures, periods, and locations based on their themes, subjects, and symbols.

4. Relate artists and works of art to their cultural, economic, and political contexts.

5. Interpret art using appropriate art historical methods, such as observation and inductive reasoning.

6. Select visual and textual evidence to support an argument or interpretation.

Revel assignments (reading and quizzes): Log into Revel frequently and check the assignment calendar to ensure you are keeping up with the assignments. You are required to complete all Revel assignments before the due date. Late submissions will not be accepted, so plan accordingly.
