Dual Credit Music Appreciation Lubbock Classical Tutorial with South Plains College Fall 2025 Mrs. Allison Smith

Course Description

An interdisciplinary course designed to introduce the students to the basic elements of music with a focus on developing a basic understanding and appreciation of music.

Learning Outcomes

"Music is meaningless noise unless it touches a receiving mind" Paul Hindemith. Music is embedded in our lives, culture, and history. It embodies humanity- the emotional, physical, and intellectual. We study music because we have been made to be moved by beauty. Students will demonstrate competency as a well-educated and well-rounded person with an abiding appreciation for music. They will develop their ability to evaluate and respond to classical music throughout music history by studying elements of music, music history and styles, and notable composers and their great works.

Teaching Methodology

In addition to lectures, the class will rely heavily on readings and listening prior to class with inclass analysis of listening examples.

Assignments

Students will complete assigned readings including the listening examples in the chapter each week. Please find the link for the playlist on page 5 of the book.

Other assignments will include listening analyses of assigned music selections.

Each student will be assigned a week for a Movie Music Moment. The student will find a movie or tv show clip with music by a composer from the reading. The class will analyze how the music enhances the scene.

With the teacher, students will select a composer to research and create a presentation. The class will meet for a "Behind the Baton: A Composer's Story."

Quizzes and Exams

Exams and pop guizzes will be from readings and lectures.

Concert Attendance

The student will attend an approved concert and write a detailed paper on the music, performance, and overall experience. The teacher will provide a listening guide to aid in the the aural analysis. This paper should be a minimum of two pages. The paper must be turned in no later than December 5th, 2025.

Final Exam

The final exam will be part cumulative written exam and part oral. There will also be an in-class discussion in which students will be given an article to annotate and discuss as a class.
